

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

All the planning for my year was done prior to COVID-19 and little did I know how that was to change. As July got closer and closer I became more and more concerned as to the health and welfare of my fellow club members.

Then June came and I threw most of my planning out the window. I considered the very viability of the Club was probably at stake, with the probability that if COVID-19 could take hold, the Club could loose

trees to make sure all members had been contacted and kept up to date of club activities. The intention was that members not attending online meetings should have had contact with a Board member once or twice during the year.

I asked Rod McDonald, as Chair of the Program Committee, to ensure we had a good range of speakers on a wide range of engaging subjects and I for one consider he has fulfilled this request in spades, thanks Rod. I suppose one good outcome of utilising the Zoom technology was the opportunity to have speakers presenting to the meeting online, without the need, and possible inconvenience, of travelling to a physical meeting. Something we are sure to use for future speakers.

The Fellowship Committee went into abeyance up until about October when there was a glimmer of hope emerging from the darkness of COVID-19 and we

Efforts were made to make sure members had the chance for fellowship and we broke the meetings up into small 'rooms', for 10 minutes at least, giving members the chance to interact on a more personal level and maintain their 'Rotary family'.

Well how wrong they were, we took in over 900 paintings on the Monday and the curatorial team worked their socks off getting all those hung and didn't they present beautifully?

The range of paintings was enormous as they came in from, I think, six different states and for nearly 30% of the artists it was the first time they had exhibited in Bendigo, thanks mainly due to the Gallery 247 partnership and subsequent promotion.

We achieved sales of 195 paintings with a value of \$105k, door entry fees were over \$16k, indicating we had over 1400 paying patrons at \$10 per head through the door in timed two-hour sessions, an outstanding result and one for which the committee should feel duly proud, particularly under the circumstances they had to endure. Well done to Brian and the crew.

Earlier in the year many of our major events were cancelled due to COVID-19 and we changed our lifestyle to living in a community bubble in the interest of public safety. The wool show, race day parking, school cross country events, caravan and camping show, then our annual carols by candlelight all succumbed to the penalties of crowd safety and were all cancelled.

The new year came and we started to discard face masks and boundaries were lifted and people started to gather at events. The Art Show was our first test on how we were to manage a COVID-19 safe community event with all the safety protocols to go with it.

Brian Figg and his team, in conjunction with the Greater City of Bendigo council staff, coordinated the event over the Easter Festival weekend, even without the usual parade. The Art Show under the leadership of Brian Figg and his committee, keep giving us a bigger and better event each year which compliments the Easter festivities in Bendigo. This event gives artists from near and far, an opportunity to display and sell their work to the many visitors in the majestic Town Hall building.

Bunnings provided us with an opportunity to be seen in public and a successful bar-bque was held at Kangaroo Flat, serving sausages and drinks to the public.

In mid-March Bob Edgar organized a team to participate in the Drought and Flood Relief Project Community Outreach Events - an Australian Government Drought Initiative. So members were off to Birchip, Kerang, Sea Lake, Ouyen, Robinvale.

Many stories were heard as people relayed their struggles and hardship suffered during the drought. Rotarians participated in 4-hourly sessions, helping farmers, farm workers and farm contractor's complete paperwork to enable them to receive a \$500 debit card. In excess of \$50,000 would have been distributed. This was very rewarding to our members and along the way we met Rotarian's from Kerang, Mildura and Robinvale who provided bar-b-que lunches and a good chat to all attending.

In April, with things returning to some normality, Greg Galloway and his team were back getting Rotarians into the swing of parking buses and cars at the racecourse for the primary school's cross-country event. This again went smoothly and a good day was had by all.

The Bendigo Winemakers Festival involved enthusiastic participation from members as they welcomed visitors to the show in the beautiful Rosiland Park which was extended to a two day COVID-19 safe event.

To all Rotarians who volunteered their time to make these events so successful during the year a big thank you, as your service has made a difference.

Congratulations to all Club Members and the Art Show Committee for an extremely successful running of the 2021 event despite the challenges of it being in a COVID-19 Safe format at the Bendigo Town Hall - being the Club's 53rd Art Show. Feedback was that this was the best quality show the Club had put on at the Bendigo Town Hall.

Some 900 paintings were exhibited with artists predominantly from Central Victoria, Geelong, Melbourne and southern NSW but many new ones from South Australia, Tasmania and Qld, noting that nearly 30% of exhibiting artists at the 2021 Show were first time exhibitors (mainly due to the Gallery 247 partnership and promotion).

We achieved sales of 195 paintings with a value of \$105,000, door entry fees were over \$16,000 (indicating we had over 1400 paying patrons at \$10 per head through the door in timed two hour sessions and around 120 at \$15 for the Preview evening) and the Raffle generated \$4,400 with all prizes kindly donated.

Surviving the pandemic was a fascinating exercise. Fortunately, the job-keeper supplement and grants from the State Government enabled the continued operation and maintenance of the camp without any detriment to our financial bottom line, despite the loss of income from camping fees.

Yours truly learnt a lot about corporate governance and risk management thanks to insistent prodding by our current Treasurer PP Glenda Bryson, RC of Keilor, making sure that we established a COVID-19 Safe Plan to meet our requirements ready for the reopening of the camp.

Since reopening, camp bookings have been very steady with most weekends booked and a high percentage of bookings for mid-week camps. Fortunately, this latest lockdown has occurred whilst our caretaker family are taking a break and the camp is closed.

On the works front, the lockdown restrictions prevented us from doing any significant work onsite during the second half of 2020. Likewise, with the steady bookings so far in 2021, opportunities to work onsite without disturbing campers has been limited.

Suffice to say, on the few occasions we did manage to get onsite, work on the Fire Protection System upgrade was completed and the system has received full certification. Following certification, Certificates of Occupancy for all five accommodation buildings were issued by the City of Greater Bendigo.

Congratulations to former Bendigo-Strathdale Rotarian, Peter Kennedy, for his relentless perseverance in achieving this very important goal. Twenty years in the making and worth every minute.

On the funding front, we were delighted to receive a Community Grant of just under \$114,000 from Kirkland Lake Gold, the operators of the Fosterville Goldmine. We submitted a wish-list of six projects with the expectation that the company may fund one or two. Instead it agreed to fund all six.

On a sad note, we lost our very dear friend and colleague Kenneth Edward Briggs OAM in September 2020. Ken was a very active member of the Camp Getaway Board for over fifteen years and he remained active until just a few months before his passing when his deteriorating health curtailed his activities. Ken was the perfect Rotarian and a great servant of the broader community, always giving of himself without question. He epitomised the Rotary motto "service above self".

The Rotary Club of Bendigo South, Ken's club for more than thirty years, gave Ken a very fitting farewell at a memorial service held at the Camp's chapel in March this year.

SHEEP SHOW

The 2020 Sheep and Wool Show was cancelled due to restrictions imposed during the COVID-19 pandemic. Funds earned by the Club for providing Occupational Health and Safety services at the Show are used to support the University Agricultural Scholarship. Alternative sources of funding were sourced enabling two scholarships to be awarded for the 2021/22 academic years.

Arrangements are in place for the Club to work at the 2021 Sheep and Wool Show where we will have a stand in the Careers and Technology Hub to promote the Scholarship and to serve as a base for OH&S activities.

While no trips to Samoa could proceed, planning continues for the day we can once again board a plane, head over and continue the rewarding work partnership of the we have built up with the local community. In the background support for the local community continues and Garry keeps in close contact, reassessing opportunities to help where possible.

While the year has been difficult, all project leads have continued to build relationships and support and we look forward to the next 12 months and the positive impacts the Rotary Club of Bendigo will continue to make within our international projects.

OPERATION CLEFT GOLF EVENT

Operation Cleft is a unique Rotary project that provides free cleft repair surgery for underprivileged children in Bangladesh and our Annual Golf Night has raised thousands of dollars towards these life changing surgeries.

After cancelling last years Golf Night because of the emergency around the bushfires across the country, it was very frustrating to lose this years event to the COVID-19 restrictions.

As expected the Cleft Palate affliction continues throughout the COVID-19

problem and Bangladesh like all countries has suffered severely from COVID-19. As of January 28th 2021, the country has reported 533,444 COVID-19 infections with a death toll of 8,072. The better news is that the second wave affect of COVID-19 in Bangladesh was thankfully not as severe as in some other Asian and European countries. The lockdown and suspension of surgeries back in March 2020 meant that families with Cleft suffering babies were under extreme stress and worry.

Our Cleft Bangladesh surgeons, despite personal risk and limitations from all the related pandemic complexities were determined to return to performing urgent surgeries at the earliest possible date, this occurred in early August 2020.

During this time, our highest priority was maintaining a COVID-safe surgical environment to ensure the highest safety of our patients and their families visiting

the hospital. Since reactivating the program in August 2020, we have (as Cleft Bangladesh) completed over 900 lifechanging surgeries. These many families are so appreciative of the work and attitude of the surgeons and their generous commitment to serve and support their cleft suffering babies/children.



Bruce McEwen, Chair of Operation Cleft, spoke at a Club luncheon in June and congratulated members on our contribution of \$106,372 over the years of our involvement and we look forward getting out on the course and next year, we hope!

NEPAL PROJECT

COVID-19 Pandemic in Nepal

The Club has been working in capacity building, education and training and health promoting projects with on-the-ground groups in Nepal since 2013; however, the COVID-19 pandemic brought a sudden halt to our grassroots projects due to national lockdowns in 2020 and 2021

Nepal is an impoverished country landlocked between India and China; the population of 28 million people is struggling to battle the COVID-19 pandemic. The World Bank estimates that about a third of Nepali's live close to the poverty line and this pandemic is collapsing the already meagre health system (www.npr.org).

COVID-19 virus has been detected in all provinces and districts in Nepal with Kathmandu one of the worst affected. Most people living in Nepal face the daily difficulty of staying safe, accessing clean food and water, and paying for goods

PAGE 10 ANNUAL REPORT and services. The cost of basics such as fuel, food staples and health-care items were inflated when Nepal borders with India and China were sealed off to trade and government services, except those providing essential services, were closed.

The Club's key partner in Kathmandu is the Progress Self-Help Group of over 40 people living with Hansen's disease (Leprosy) and are among the most stigmatised, marginalised and disenfranchised groups in Nepal.

The Self-Help Group requested urgent assistance from the Club for food staples and fuel for cooking as their need for support during the initial severe lockdowns was desperate. In rapid response the Club responded by providing two Food and Cooking Relief Packages in July and October, 2020.

COVID-19 Rapid Response Food and Cooking Relief Packages



Funding for two packages of relief aid was submitted to the Progress Self-Help Group in July and October, 2020. The program provided funds for the purchase of food-staples including mixed beans, flour, noodles, oil, salt, and refilling gas bottles used for cooking.

In total an amount of AUD\$3,400 was provided to fund two distribution programs on-the-ground in Kathmandu. The Progress Self-Help Group organised the relief distribution programs and facilitated the program enabling everyone equitable access to food-staples and gas-bottle refill funds.

It is pleasing to note that the Progress Self-Help Group had capacity to contribute financially to the project from monies generated from its tailoring, handcraft and egg-selling micro credit businesses established with the help of the Club in 2016.

The group sends its thanks and is grateful to have received the rapid response package stating it has had a direct and

positive wellbeing impact for recipients their families.

On behalf of the Nepal Committee I wish to sincerely thank the Club and individual members for their generous donations and ongoing support for Nepal.

Educational and Training Program

Mr Nawang Tamang, our current Education and Training Program recipient, commenced his 4th year of study in May, 2021, in Kathmandu, Nepal. Nawang is completing his social work degree to improve youth mental health and wellbing outcomes.

Due to the global COVID-19 pandemic and national lockdowns in Nepal, Nawang's 3rd year was conducted online with classes delivered via distance learning. During lockdown Nawang successfully studied and completed International Social Work, Law and Social Work and Social Work Research.

3rd year exams were undertaken later than usual due to COVID-19-related difficulties, results are pending. Now studying for his 4th year Masters qualification Nawang writes –

"In my final year, I am studying program design and evaluation, advanced social work research, social work in disaster management, social entrepreneurship, social work dissertation and social work field practicum. I have urban camp in my final year, which will be conduct out of country and it has not been fixed due to the pandemic."

Nawang has now returned to his remote area village to support his family during pandemic lockdown. The Club's congratulations and best wishes were extended to Nawang for his commitment to studies during a difficult year and for his and his family's health and wellbeing.

We wish Nawang every success for attainment of his Masters of Social Work Degree in 2021.

Samoan Beekeeper Training

Following the visit of Norma Tauiliili, under the Royce and Jean Abbey Scholarship Program, in 2017 and the subsequent visit by Bendigo TAFE students to Samoa, the Club established a project to train beekeepers in Samoa.

Funding was obtained from the Crawford Fund for International Agriculture to support the visit of two beekeepers from Central Victoria to Samoa with the potential of a follow up visit by young beekeepers from Samoa as Royce and Jean Abbey scholars. However, with the travel restrictions imposed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, it has not been possible to implement this work.

It could be at least two years before travel to and from Samoa is readily undertaken and it is expected the fares, accommodation, insurance and other travel costs may have increased significantly so a new proposal will need to be developed when conditions are suitable for travel.

SAMOA PROJECT

The last 12 months has not seen any hands-on activity in Samoa due to the ongoing COVID-19 virus restrictions in place. This has prevented any international travel and our planned project continuing to be on hold.

The project was to upgrade previous computer training facilities and general maintenance work at a remote village primary school. We now hope the situation with COVID-19 settles down and allows us to return in 2022.

Similarly, the planned beekeeping project under Bob Edgar's direction was initially put on hold but has now been cancelled. Again, we hope to be able to re-visit a similar type project in the next 12 months or so.

Not all has been lost and the Club was able to conduct its annual collection of exercise books and stationary items. Over 4000 exercise books and considerable stationary items have been obtained with a big thank you to members efforts and the work of Henry Rasmussen with Peter Reading.





D9800 Foundation Grants

Four club members attended the D9800 Foundation Grants Seminar, which was conducted via ZOOM on Sunday 14th June 2020. Clubs were required to have at least one member in attendance to be able to qualify for District and Global Grants during the 2020/2021 Rotary Year.

After the seminar, D9800 Humanitarian Grants Committee invited all D9800 Rotary Clubs to submit a Grants Intention Application to enable District to have some idea of the number of clubs that were likely to be making application(s) for District Foundation Grants in the 2020/2021 Rotary Year.

Following suggestions from a number of club members on likely projects, upon which we may base a Grants Submission, the Board agreed to submit a Grants

Intention Application for a project involving the "Support of local First Nations young women seeking a health related career", submitted by Julie Sloan and Lisa Pearson.

Unfortunately, because of difficulty in establishing a line of communication with the "Weenthunga Health Network", through which the project would have operated, we were unable to pursue the project any further and an actual Grant Application was not submitted.

The Club's Foundation Directorate will have to work harder this coming Year.

New Rotary Foundation Club Recognition Program

During the year, Rotary District 9800 announced a new Rotary Foundation Club Recognition Program.

The Rotary Foundation has an extensive range of programs to acknowledge the personal contributions of Rotarians

and other individual donors. However, in Australia and New Zealand, about half the giving to the Foundation comes from our clubs, and until now, there hasn't been a good program to recognise clubs for their generosity.

Therefore, from the end of the 2020/21 year, District 9800 will join with other districts in Australia and New Zealand with two new programs to recognise clubs. They will be known as the "Club Annual Donor" and the "Club Major Donor" recognitions.

The "Club Annual Donor" program will recognise Club giving over the previous 12 months. To ensure it is open to clubs of all sizes, the program will work on a permember basis.

Like the Major Donor program for individuals, the "Club Major Donor" program will be based on all-time giving and will be a way of thanking clubs for their sustained support for our Foundation over many years.

For the statistically minded, my interpretation of RI records indicates that the Club's all-time giving is around \$128,700.

During Rotary Centurion Week, two of our Club members, Bill Gray and Noel Hobley, committed to become a Rotary Centurion, with each contributing \$100 to the Rotary Foundation.



Rotary Foundation International Grant for a Nepal Community

At President Graeme's request, an inquiry was made with the D9800 Foundation Grants Committee to ascertain the possibility of obtaining a Rotary Foundation International Grant to bolster our fund raising effort to immediately support a self-help group in Nepal.

The group was providing much-needed and urgent relief for a community of people suffering from Hansen's Disease (leprosy).

As expected, a grant was only possible if we had an established link with a Rotary Club in Nepal, which could administer the funds.

We had no such link and as the support that we could provide was needed immediately we couldn't wait to establishment a link. Consequently, we had to proceed without the assistance of a grant.

Notwithstanding, we should proceed with establishing a link with Rotary Club(s) in Nepal, to enhance our chances of obtaining a Rotary Foundation Grant for our future fund-raising efforts.

End Polio Now

I would like to acknowledge the efforts of my predecessor Larisa Wasiljew in her initiative to arrange "walks around the parks" to raise money for the Rotary Foundation's "End Polio Now" project.



Contributions to the Rotary Foundation

According to RI records, six club members have contributed to the Foundation's Polio Plus project this year and another six members have contributed directly to the Foundation.

Congratulations to PP Michael Pearson on his US\$1,000 contribution to the Foundation and his PHF recognition. He joins the five-strong cohort of current club members who have contributed US\$1,000+ to the Foundation, either directly or through the Polio-Plus project. Let us hope more members follow his lead. So far this year, the Club has contributed \$4,250 to the Rotary Foundation and an additional \$1,000 to Polio Plus. Further disbursements may be possible.

Agricultural Scholarship


The Club introduced this scholarship in late 2019 following our involvement in the 2019 Australian Sheep and Wool Show to align a recurring beneficial distribution as a long term investment in agricultural education and expertise in Australia.

The scholarship provides financial support of \$4,000.00 over two years with the following criteria:-

- Be a first-time undergraduate tertiary student;
- Have completed secondary school in Bendigo;
- Show sound academic achievement and community involvement;
- Have been offered a place at to study agriculture at University or a postsecondary agricultural college;
- Demonstrate an understanding of agricultural industries;
- Have a career commitment that will ultimately benefit agriculture and/or regional and rural communities;
- Be an Australian citizen or permanent resident.

Our first recipient for the 2020 scholarship was Macey Stephens who has been in regular contact with Committee and is progressing very well, now in her second year despite the challenges of COVID-19. Macey has presented to the Club on two occasions in the past 18 months.

For the 2021-22 Scholarship, the candidates were of such high calibre, the Committee awarded two recipients,

COMMUNITY IN ACTION COMMITTEE

This last year has been a struggle for so many families doing it tough under normal circumstances. The added stress that lock downs have had on families and individuals on the edge has been enormous. With so many events cancelled and fundraising basically unable to be organised we faced some challenges to try to support the two organisations that we donate to, especially around Christmas time.

It was therefore fantastic when current President Graeme Clarke, Tom Dobelli and several other men in our fabulous Rotary Club came up with a great way to add value to the limited funds we had available. They approached both IGA and Mitre10 to see if they would match the purchase of vouchers with extra vouchers to be able to help as many people as possible with what they needed over Christmas and into the new year.

These vouchers were called "Random acts of kindness" vouchers and were given to both Bendigo Community Health and Cuppa with company.



This message was sent to us from Rod Case at Bendigo Health:

Random Act of Kindness vouchers helped our most vulnerable clients through desperate times. Support is so important at Christmas when the pressure on parents to provide for their families impacts heavily on the stress they feel when they do not have the means to do this. Some of the vouchers have been used by our Alcohol and Other Drugs team for people under their care.

Perhaps the biggest difference the vouchers made was for our Child and Family Services clients through Christmas, January and in the months after when COVID-19 lockdowns had such a drastic impact.

Strong Families team manager Megan Staley said: "We have provided the families needing food relief with the IGA cards to purchase groceries. The Mitre 10 vouchers have been used to support families to support maintaining tenancy, (repairs to broken items) but we are also aware of the various items that people can gain from the shop such as heaters and other in-house items they may need support in gaining."

Families were so grateful and thankful at receiving the cards and support.

Our Multi-Disciplinary Centre nurse Liz Morley used vouchers to help victims of domestic violence.

"I gave one to a client in her 40s who was living in her car at English's Bridge camping ground," Liz said. "Tears of gratitude and tears because they felt someone cared and someone was kind to them. I did tell them everything was donated by very generous people and groups in Bendigo."

Having vouchers available to provide instant relief literally changes lives. We can't thank the Rotary Club of Bendigo enough for your generous 'Random Acts of Kindness' donation and the difference this has made for individuals and families struggling through life.

Cuppa with company manager Angela had the same stories of families who have been able to buy food, storage containers, tools, thermal gloves, torches, and men's stuff they otherwise would not have been able to afford. They had an extra 300 families needing support and gave some of the vouchers to their Emergency Relief arm as well as being able to fund storage containers for their food pantry and personal care items that are given out as needed. They have also established a vegetable garden for clients to help tend which provides fresh vegies for the meals that are provided on Thursdays.

My thanks go out to all those members of our Club who thought outside the box to make this happen and brought some sunshine into the lives of those who needed help.




