The documentary was filmed by Australian war photographer, Damien Parer and directed by Ken G Hall. It won an Academy Award and an Oscar for best documentary. The most popular film in 1944 overall was the musical comedy: Going my Way with Bing Crosby and Barry Fitzgerald. The most popular song for the year was: Swinging On a Star, by Bing Crosby.



D-Day begins on June 6. It is the beginning of the end of the Second World War in Europe.

In Bendigo, the new President in 1944/45 was Ern B Pederick. President Pederick did not complete his year as the Education Department transferred him to Melbourne and PP George Hibbard became the Acting President.

Rotarian J.V. Schenck moved that we refrain from having another Garden Week watth Autumn 1946. Seconded by Rotarian A.H.Jones and carried.

Rotarian A.H. Jones mention d the fact that he thought the Kerang Horticultural Society may loan fittings for any flower show we may arrange in the future if tactfully approached.

It was recommended that any future competition be known as Rotary Garden Week and not "Clean the City" Competition.

That "Footpath to gutter" be not included in the Garden Competition but, if warranted, to be run as a special section of the Competition.

That the competition be run in sections according to size of property.

That final judging be done by independent judge outside the City of Bendigo who shall be asked to give a comment on each section, and also supply a copy to each entrant.

That a copy of the judging points be incorporated in the entry form.

That 100 points be allotted for the vegetable section.
